Important The FAFSA is open! I cannot stress how important it is to complete the FAFSA. Completing the FAFSA makes you eligible for FREE grants from the federal government for college, technical training, and cosmetology programs. Even if you think your family makes too much money to qualify for grants, the FAFSA is required by many programs for additional scholarship consideration. If your student is planning to go to TMCC and has applied for the **Nevada Promise Scholarship** which covers their tuition, FAFSA completion is a requirement of the scholarship. If your student is planning to go to UNR, they may be eligible for a full scholarship based off their FAFSA completion. <u>If you have any questions, please</u>

 - see below under scholarships for more information and the link to complete



Not really sure whether you or your child should fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or whether it affects you?

You should — and it probably does.



IT'S FREE

The FAFSA doesn't cost anything to complete.



The application has been majorly simplified over the past few years — and there are helpful pointers throughout.



IT'S FAST.

It takes most students just 23 minutes to complete the FAFSA: less time than it would take to watch your favorite show.



YOU PROBABLY QUALIFY.

More people qualify for federal student aid than you think — chances are, you're leaving money on the table by not applying.



IT MAY BE REQUIRED.

Many states, schools, and private scholarships require you to submit the FAFSA before they'll consider you for any financial aid.

TIPS:

- Please do Due Dilligence and make sure that all scholarships you apply for are legitimate.
- NEVER pay for scholarship applications or fees.
- Make sure all pages you submit are typed, NEAT, well edited, and that all the information you include is true and verifiable.
- Always try and beat the deadline posted.
- National scholarships can involve BIG money. However, they are very difficult to get. Go LOCAL if you can. Look for local stores, businesses, or perhaps your parent(s) employer may offer scholarships.
- Try to submit applications as least one week before the due date. Online servers can get overloaded and stop working properly when everyone submits them on the last day. In addition, remember to account for the delivery time if mailing an application.
- NEVER NEVER pay to submit a scholarship application. (This is a duplication, but bears repeating.)
- Always spell check and proof-read applications.
- Make sure you have submitted everything requested and answered all the questions.
- Don't submit anything that isn't asked for, and stay under the required word count.
- Photocopy everything before you submit it, in case your application gets lost and needs to be resubmitted.
- Professionalize your online presence, remove potentially embarrassing content from social media. Use an appropriate email address.
- Gather information early. Most scholarships require various versions of:
 - o Community service activities, hours, location, services
 - Personal Essay
 - Letters of recommendations
 - o Resume with test scores, honors classes, and awards received

MILLENIUM SCHOLARSHIP

REWARDING NEVADA'S STUDENTS FOR BEING AT THE HEAD OF THE CLASS.



HOW DO I BECOME A MILLENNIUM SCHOLAR?

Students will be eligible when **all** the following conditions are met

- Graduate with a Nevada high school diploma*;
- Earn at least a 3.25 GPA (weighted or unweighted) or a qualifying test score of 1070 on the SAT or 21 on the ACT. ACT superscores are not accepted. Only composite scores from a single test date will be considered.
- Complete the following core curriculum: 4 units in English, 4 units in Math (including Algebra II or higher), 3 units in Science, 3 units in Social Science or History
- Be a Nevada resident for at least two years of their high school career

All requirements must be met by the date of high school graduation.

MATRICULATION PROCESS

There is no application process for traditional students that graduate from a Nevada public, private or charter high school. Students qualify by meeting the eligibility requirements listed above. High schools and school districts submit student information for those who have qualified upon high school graduation.

SCHOLARSHIP DISBURSEMENTS

To receive the benefits of the Governor Guinn Millennium Scholarship (GGMS), students must enroll in an eligible institution of higher education in Nevada. Please note, receiving the Millennium Scholarship does not guarantee admission to any of Nevada's eligible in-state institutions.

To receive scholarship disbursements as a Millennium Scholar:

- Students must be enrolled in a program of study leading to a recognized
- associate degree, baccalaureate degree, or pre-baccalaureate certificate.
- Students must be enrolled in at least 9 semester credits at an eligible community college or 12 semester credits at another eligible institution.

MAINTAINING ELIGIBILITY

To maintain eligibility for the GGMS, students must meet three requirements at the end of each semester for which they receive funding.

To maintain eligibility as a Millennium scholar:

- Students must make satisfactory academic progress in their program of study.
- Students must earn at least a 2.75 semester GPA.
- Students must complete at least 9 semester credits at an eligible community college
- or 12 semester credits at another eligible institution.

If a student fails to meet the minimum requirements in any semester for which they received funding, the student will receive a strike, and the scholarship will be suspended. Eligibility for the Millennium Scholarship can be regained by meeting all the requirements listed above in a subsequent semester. If loss of eligibility is incurred a second time, the student will be permanently removed from the program.

All requirements for the scholarship are outlined in Nevada Revised Statutes Chapter 396, Board of Regents Handbook Title 4 Chapter 18, and NSHE Procedures and Guidelines Chapter 12.

- *This information is subject to any changes in State law, policies adopted by the NSHE Board of Regents, availability of funding, and any related matters thereto.
- **Applications for students who did not graduate from a Nevada public, private or
- charter high school can be found on the GGMS website www.nvggms.gov.
- ***A qualified SAT/ACT score only replaces a GPA below 3.25
- Students are still required to meet the other requirements.



I APPLIED FOR COLLEGE... NOW WHAT???

1. FOLLOW UP AND TRACK APPLICATION STATUS:

- Keep a record: Maintain a spreadsheet or document to track the colleges you have applied to, application deadlines, and any required documents or materials.
- Check application status: Regularly check the application portals or contact the admissions offices to track the status of your applications. This will help you stay informed about any missing documents or additional steps you need to take.
- <u>Submit any outstanding materials: If there are any missing documents or additional materials required by the colleges, submit them promptly to complete your application.</u>

2. EXPLORE FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS:

- Complete the <u>FAFSA In DECEMBER</u> when it opens for the 2024-2025 School year. You NEED to do this to recieve aid. Complete the FAFSA even if you don't think you'll qualify for aid.
- Research scholarships: Look for scholarships offered by the colleges you have applied to, as well as external scholarships. Check with your school's guidance office, local organizations, and online scholarship databases for opportunities.
- Submit scholarship applications: Follow the instructions and deadlines for each scholarship application. Pay attention to any required essays, recommendation letters, or other supporting documents.

3. VISIT COLLEGES AND ATTEND VIRTUAL EVENTS:

- Schedule campus visits: If possible, plan visits to the colleges you are most interested in. This will give you a chance to explore the campus, meet with faculty or admissions staff, and get a feel for the college environment.
- Attend virtual events: Many colleges offer virtual tours, information sessions, and webinars. Take advantage of these opportunities to learn more about the colleges and ask any questions you may have.

4. MAKE A DECISION:

- Review acceptance letters: Once you start receiving acceptance letters, carefully review the offers, including financial aid packages, scholarships, and any other factors important to you.
- Compare options: Consider factors such as academic programs, campus culture, location, cost, and career opportunities. Make a pros and cons list or use a decision-making matrix to help you compare and evaluate your options.
- Consult with trusted advisors: Seek guidance from your school counselor, teachers, and family members to help you make an informed decision.
