

Military Service

Advanced Placement (AP)

What is it?

Courses that are taught in high school, but at a college level, with the potential to earn college credit based off of the AP exam. Entering college with credit that has already been earned through AP can save time and money, such as skipping introductory courses.

Getting Credit

Colleges set their own policies on awarding college credit for an AP exam score. Go to www.apstudents.collegeboard.org and go to "AP Credit Policy Search" to learn which colleges accept AP scores for credit.

Score Reports

Students have to request College Board send their official score report to the college of their choice. One free score report is sent to the college designated on the test answer document.


5 = Extremely well qualified

Advanced Placement (AP)


Cost

AP exams are offered in late spring each year. The cost of each exam is about \$100; however, WCSD received a grant that will be covering this cost for all students for the 25-26 school year.

AP tests occur each May and scores are not received until around mid-July



Dual Credit



1

- College credit is earned, along with high school credit, at a reduced financial cost

2

- Final grades are recorded on BOTH the high school and college transcripts

3

- Students must meet prerequisite requirements in order to enter a dual credit class



McQueen Dual Credit

McQueen partners with TMCC and is a member of the UNR Collegiate Academy to offer dual credit classes on our campus. These are taught by McQueen teachers using TMCC or UNR curriculum.

Some dual credit classes are stretched over the full school year, whereas others are in the traditional semester format.





Dual Credit Fees


McQueen dual credit classes are \$75 per class, whereas off-campus dual credit classes that are taken directly through TMCC or UNR cost about \$300 each.

McQueen dual credit fees for the 25-26 school year will be paid for by a grant that WCSD has received. **This WILL NOT cover the fees associated with an off-campus dual credit class that the student takes directly through TMCC or UNR.**



Letters of Recommendation




McQueen Counselors

- Complete the “Request for Letter of Recommendation” form
- Submit form along with updated resume **AT LEAST TWO WEEKS** prior to the deadline date...earlier if possible
- Form can be found on the McQueen Counseling website at <https://www.washoeschools.net/Page/16331>, or a paper copy can be picked up in the Counseling Office



Teachers/Administrators

- Talk with teachers/administrators now
- Common courtesy – give at least two weeks notice
- Submit updated resume (copy of Request for Letter of Recommendation form is a plus)



College Essays

- For colleges/scholarship providers to get to know the student
- Generally, students write a personal story about an event or someone who has influenced them

Students must request their ACT or SAT test scores be sent directly to their college of choice





Scholarships**





FAFSA

Also known as the Free Application for Federal Student Aid

Every college-bound student must complete this. Opens each year on October 1st

This is how students learn if they are eligible for any federal financial aid, but colleges also use FAFSA data to make in-house financial aid decisions



Nevada Millennium Scholarship

Any student who earns the Advanced or Honors Diploma will meet the academic requirements for this scholarship. There is also a Nevada residency requirement.

There is not an application!



McQueen Scholarships

We have many partnerships with community organizations and donors to support a scholarship program for the graduating senior class each year. One application and essay for consideration to multiple awards. Typically opens around the Fall of each year.



TMCC Promise Scholarship

Any student, regardless of household income, can apply for this opportunity. Once all steps are completed, this can pay nearly 100% of all tuition and fees for up to three years of college. The due date to apply for this opportunity is October 31 of each year.

UNR Scholarship Matrix

When students submit an admissions application, they are automatically considered for New Freshmen Scholarships. There are awards that require a qualifying test score (ACT or SAT) and unweighted GPA, and there are also unweighted GPA-only awards.





Testing



Testing

1 ACT

All juniors take the ACT at McQueen each spring. Some students elect to re-take the ACT to try to earn a higher score. Sometimes an increase of 1-2 points could mean more scholarship money. Go to www.act.org to learn how to sign up for a National ACT testing session.

2 SAT

Some students elect to take the SAT because they are trying to earn a qualifying score for a college or scholarship opportunity. Research the admissions and scholarship requirements at the colleges the student wishes to apply to determine if this is the right choice. Go to www.collegeboard.org to schedule a National SAT testing session.

3 ASVAB

Also known as the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery. This is required for entrance into military service; however, McQueen does not share results with recruiters. This is offered for free two times per school year and results are valid for two calendar years. Students gain access to the Career Exploration Program, which is a robust career interest inventory that focuses on civilian careers.



